We construct giant mechanical puppets, devise theatre, create film, produce events, tell stories, uncover hidden history, deliver training, generate online resources, write books, construct exhibitions, develop educational materials, develop partnerships, advise policymakers, repair Cornish hedges and build labyrinths...amongst other activities.

We work in collaboration with audiences that are currently under-engaged in heritage and arts, particularly those that are disadvantaged. We do this by designing cultural, educational and environmental solutions intended to make a meaningful and lasting difference to these communities.

Our vision is to be global trailblazers in Cornish culture. For every project we work on we quarantee:

- i) authentic Cornish provenance,
- ii) genuine contemporary relevance
- iii) highest artistic quality.



#### **PROJECTS**

## 2019-2023 | Kerdroya: The Cornish Landscape Labyrinth

Kerdroya will be a major piece of permanent public art — a 56m diameter classical labyrinth built entirely of Cornish hedging at Colliford Lake on Bodmin Moor. Commissioned to celebrate 60 years of the Cornwall Area of Outstanding National Beauty and raise awareness of the significance of Cornish hedges. Funded by Cornwall Council, Cornwall AONB, Arts Council England, National Lottery Heritage Fund, Feast and Cornwall Heritage Trust.

## 2021-2022 | Hellfire Kernow: Setting the Spark

Hellfire Kernow was a project with three Cornish cultural starting points; the *plen an gwari*, medieval liturgical drama and the sport of Hurling to Goal. We staged the first Hellfire Kernow event in May 2022, reviving an ancient Cornish sport with community engagement workshops and a tournament. Funded by an Arts Council England National Lottery Project Grant and Redruth Unlimited, funded through Historic England.

#### 2017-2022 | Go Cornish

We developed the Go Cornish website of resources and a programme of interactive Go Cornish events that took place in schools, pubs and community spaces across. This work was followed by the launch of the Go Cornish for Primary Schools programme, giving every child growing up in Cornwall the opportunity to learn something of the Cornish language. Awarded the 'Cornish Language Learning and Communication Fund' by Cornwall Council.

#### 2015-2022 | Plen an Gwari

In 2015 we worked with a host of experts and volunteers to locate 'lost' *plen an gwari* sites whilst engaging local communities and raising awareness of this aspect of Cornish heritage, funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. In 2022 we produced an R&D report, commissioned by The Towns Vitality Fund and managed by Redruth Town Council, exploring the possible construction of a *plen an gwari* in Redruth, with potential to become an important community hub.

### 2019 | The TickBox Bus

Commissioned by Cornwall Council and the Framework Convention of the Protection of National Minorities, The Tick Box Bus was created to lobby for a Cornish tick box in the 2021 census in a thought-provoking and entertaining way.

## 2015-2018 | The Man Engine

Commissioned by the Cornwall Mining World Heritage Site as the centerpiece of their 2016 'Tinth' anniversary programme, The Man Engine (largest mechanical puppet ever constructed in Britain) was a multi-faceted cultural heritage project. Awarded the 'Best Arts Project 2016' by The National Lottery. Based on the audience figures, the economic impact of the Man Engine tour is calculated at £2,973,060.

#### 2016 | Tosta

We devised a programme of activities over a period of ten months culminating in a Cornish language 'Pop-Up Festival Village'. This was Cornwall's contribution to the 'TOSTA: Cultural Cargo' project, which was part of Donostia/ San Sebastian's designation as European Capital of Culture in 2016. Funded by Cornwall Council and Donostia/San Sebastian.

## 2014 | Gogmagog

Gogmagog was a reworking of the ancient Cornish creation myth, and was a contemporary recreation of the medieval Cornish 'Plen an Gwari' experience. Funded by Arts Council England, Visit Cornwall and Real Ideas Organisation.

## 2014 | Any Resemblance

We worked in collaboration with ACT, Le Groupe Ouest (leading digital media development agency in Finisterre) and the Cornwall Chamber of Commerce to produce a series of twenty films, shortlisted for the Celtic Media Festival 'Factual Series' Award, exploring Cornish and Breton business leadership - supported with European Interreg Funding.

## 2012 | Kernocopia

Kernocopia was Cornwall's official submission to the 2012 Cultural Olympiad. We commissioned a team of artists to work with community groups and bring 25 Cornish sporting stories to life. Funded by Cornwall Council, CDC, Eden Project and Feast.
